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## 143 OUT OF 193 PARTICIPANTS OF UN GENERAL ASSEMBLY ADOPTED RESOLUTION ON RESPECT FOR TERRITORIAL INTEGRITY OF UKRAINE



The UN General Assembly has adopted a resolution on respect for the territorial integrity of Ukraine, which also condemns Russia's attempt to annex the temporarily occupied territories of Donetsk, Luhansk, Kherson and Zaporozhye regions of Ukraine.

According to the broadcast from the General Assembly hall, 143 out of 193 participants voted in favor, 35 countries abstained (Algeria, Armenia, Bolivia, Burundi, Central African Republic, China, Congo, Cuba, Eritrea, Eswatini, Ethiopia, Guinea, Honduras, India, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Laos, Lesotho, Mali, Mongolia, Mozambique, Namibia, Pakistan, South Africa, South Sudan, Sri Lanka, Sudan, Tajikistan, Thailand, Togo, Uganda, Tanzania, Uzbekistan, Vietnam, Zimbabwe), voted 5 against (Belarus, DPRK, Nicaragua, Russia and Syria).

# IMF ESTIMATED DEFICIT OF STATE FINANCES OF UKRAINE AT \$ 3-4 BILLION PER MONTH

Difficult year awaits Ukraine in 2023: the public finance deficit is estimated at \$3-4 billion, it is necessary to ensure the stability of the economy, and the IMF will provide support: an international forum will be convened in the near future to solve this problem, said the Managing Director of the International Monetary Fund Kristalina Georgieva.

“We need to learn how to ensure the sustainability of the economy. According to our preliminary estimates, three to four billion dollars are needed monthly,” she said at the second meeting of the “round table” of ministers to support Ukraine as part of the annual meeting of the IMF and the World Bank in Washington.

Responding to the call of the President of Ukraine Volodymyr Zelensky to organize an economic forum, which meets on a regular basis, and considers the macro-situation in the country, the lack of funding and solves the problem of its reduction, Georgieva said that such work is already underway.

“We will convene the forum as soon as possible,” the head of the IMF said.

She also noted that the Fund has a new platform for interaction, allowing for monitoring jointly with the board of directors, which is the way to a full-fledged program for Ukraine, which Zelensky called for.



*“We are moving with you in the direction of a strong Ukraine,” Georgieva stressed.*

US Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen noted that a new IMF program for Ukraine could be early next year.

Georgieva clarified that the Fund’s team, together with the Ukrainian team, immediately after the annual meeting of the IMF and the WB, will determine the macroeconomic framework and budget of Ukraine.

She recalled that Ukraine’s international partners have already mobilized \$35 billion, a significant part of which has already been transferred, and called for further support, especially in the form of grants.

According to Georgieva, further needs will be determined, firstly, by the cost of social services, which depends on war and migration, and secondly, the cost of restoring vital infrastructure, which also depends on war and on prioritization.

“And thirdly, what are the energy needs of the country, how much needs to be imported to provide for people in Ukraine, and this depends, of course, on the horrors of war,” the managing director added.

## UKRAINE RECEIVES \$1.3 BLN IN ADDITIONAL EMERGENCY IMF FINANCING

Ukraine has received \$1.3 billion in additional emergency financing from the International Monetary Fund (IMF), Prime Minister Denys Shmyhal has said.

“\$1.3 billion of additional emergency financing from the International Monetary Fund has arrived in Ukraine. The funds will be used to finance priority needs: strengthening defense capabilities, paying pensions, social programs and supporting the economy,” Shmyhal wrote on his Telegram channel on Thursday.



According to him, in general, since the beginning of the full-scale war, the IMF has provided Ukraine with \$2.7 billion.

“Also, in the near future, we will start preparing a new special program with the Fund, which will start working next year. We thank our partners and allies for their unwavering support,” the prime minister said.

# UKRAINIAN PARLIAMENT VOTED FOR E-RESIDENCY

The Verkhovna Rada on Thursday, with 252 votes out of the required 226, adopted the law (No. 5270) “On Amendments to the Tax Code of Ukraine and Certain Other Legislative Acts of Ukraine on the Peculiarities of Taxation of Entrepreneurial Activities of Electronic Residents” (E-residency), the information says on the parliament website.

“By the second reading, we have expanded the list of professions for e-residents from IT specialists to all other service exporters,” MP Yaroslav Zheleznyak, co-author of the law, commented on the decision of the Rada.

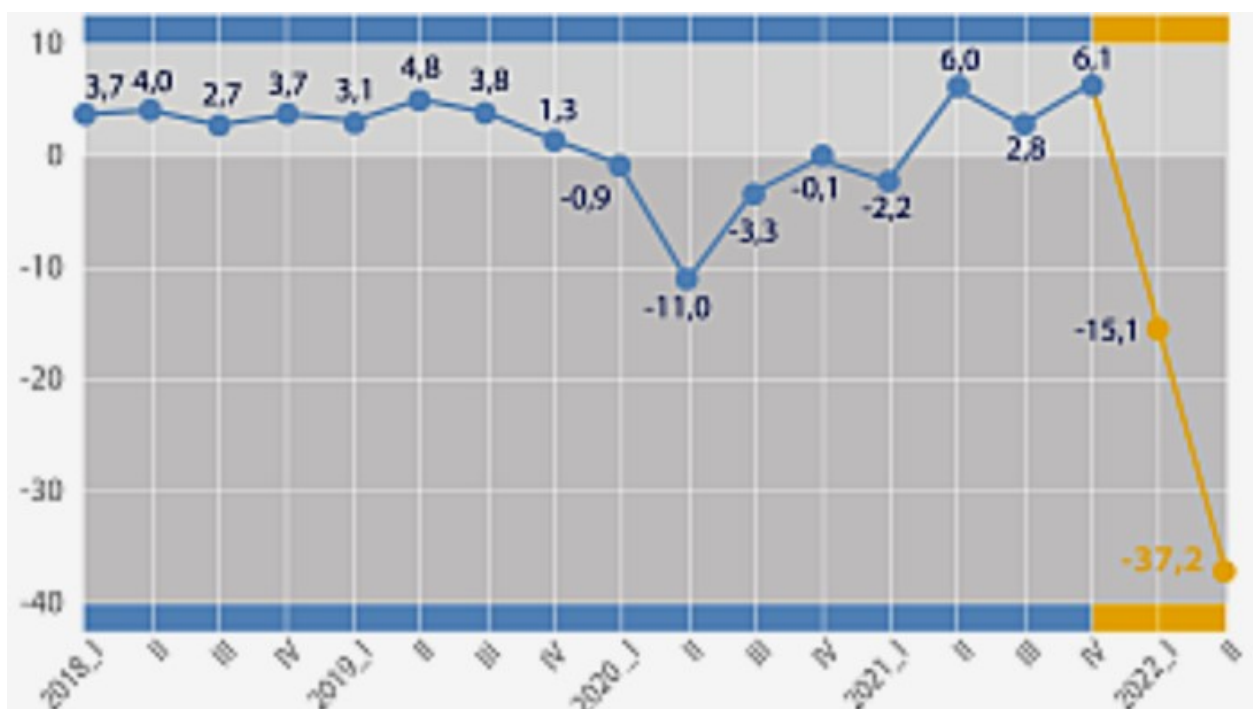
According to him, E-residency is an opportunity for foreigners to “transport” their business to Ukraine in a couple of clicks without having to physically move. “This is a great option for specialists in countries with a difficult political and economic situation to work with developed civilized markets and protect their income,” he said.

The deputy specified that in order to become an E-resident – an electronic single tax payer in the third group of the simplified taxation system without VAT at a rate of 5% within the limit, a specialist must register with Die and pass a financial and security check. After that, he receives an electronic digital signature and opens a bank account. In this case, it is the bank that will be the tax agent for the E-resident.

All documents of the E-resident are stored in electronic form, all calculations and correspondence with the state tax service are also made online, Zheleznyak added.

# INTERNATIONAL RESERVES OF UKRAINE AS OF OCTOBER 1 AMOUNT TO \$23.93 BILLION

The international reserves of Ukraine as of October 1, 2022, according to preliminary data, amounted to \$23 billion 929.6 million (in equivalent), which is 5.9% less than at the beginning of September (\$25.436 billion), according to the data of the National Bank of Ukraine.

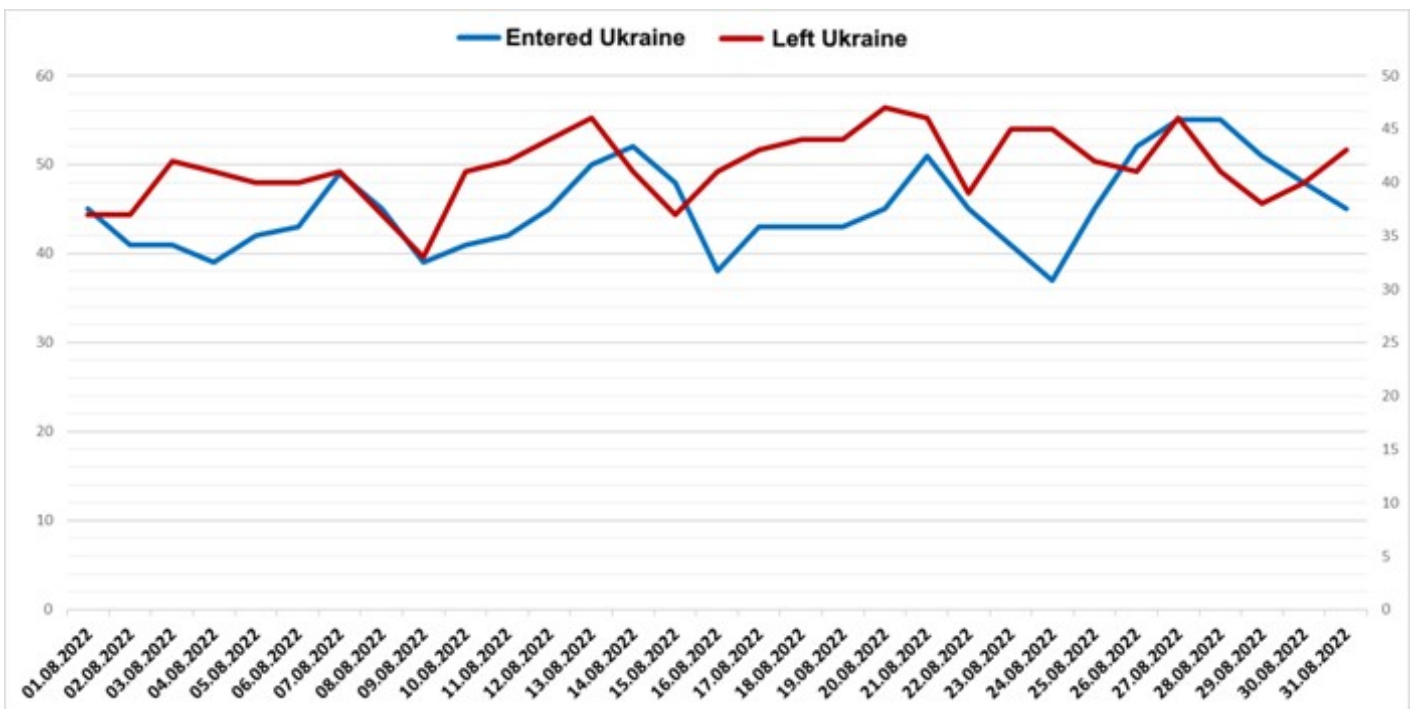
“As of October 1, 2022, Ukraine’s international reserves, according to preliminary data, amounted to \$23.929 billion. In September, they decreased by 5.9%, taking into account the sale of foreign currency by the National Bank on the interbank market, including to meet defense needs and payments of Ukrainians abroad. At that At the same time, steady receipts from international partners continue to keep international reserves at a sufficient level, despite a full-scale war,” the regulator explained.

“ *The regulator clarified that net international reserves in September decreased by 4.6%, or \$736 million, to \$15.181 billion, while in August their growth was 26.6%, or \$3 billion 342 million (to \$15.917 billion).*

According to the National Bank, in September the dynamics of international reserves was affected by operations to manage public debt. In particular, foreign exchange receipts to the accounts of the Ukrainian government with the NBU in September amounted to \$2.034 billion, including from the United States – \$1.5 billion, from the EU – \$482 million, from the placement of government bonds – \$51.7 million.

The total volume of board payments for servicing and repaying state debt in foreign currency amounted to \$65.1 million, including \$63 million directed to repay debt to international creditors, \$2.1 million – to service government bonds.

## NATO SECRETARY GENERAL CONDEMNS RUSSIAN ATTACKS ON UKRAINE'S CIVILIAN INFRASTRUCTURE



NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg had a conversation with Ukrainian Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba in connection with massive rocket attacks on Ukrainian cities on the morning of October 10.

“Spoke to Foreign Minister Kuleba and condemned Russia’s horrendous and indiscriminate attacks on civilian infrastructure in Ukraine. NATO will continue to support the courageous Ukrainian people in fighting the Kremlin’s aggression for as long as it takes,” Stoltenberg tweeted.

## OMAN IS INVITED TO PARTICIPATE IN RESTORATION OF UKRAINE

First Deputy Chairman of the Verkhovna Rada Oleksandr Kornienko invited Oman to consider the possibility of participating in the restoration of Ukrainian regions affected by Russian aggression.



According to the press service of the office of the Verkhovna Rada, Kornienko made such a proposal during a meeting with a delegation headed by Chairman of the Advisory Council of the Sultanate of Oman Khalid Al-Maawali at the site of the Assembly of the Inter-Parliamentary Union in Kigala (Rwanda).

He also called for the creation of inter-parliamentary friendship groups.

“The creation of inter-parliamentary friendship groups will be an important first step to enhance cooperation between the legislative bodies of Ukraine and Oman,” Kornienko said.

# KYIV MUSEUMS ASK FOR HELP IN RESTORATION

The capital's museums that suffered from rocket fire are closed until approximately October 16, the liquidation of the consequences is underway, and fundraising for restoration work has been announced.

The Khanenko Museum, in particular, reported that the team was not injured, the collection has been safe since the beginning of Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine.

"The work on assessing the damage is ongoing. You probably saw in numerous photos and videos from the scene that the windows of the museum were damaged. We have already blocked them and removed the broken glass. Thanks to the friends and volunteers of the museum for this!" on Facebook.

## TURKISH PRESIDENT PROPOSES THAT BLACK SEA GRAIN INITIATIVE BE CONTINUED

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan has called for continuing the implementation of the Istanbul agreement on the shipment of grain and fertilizers from Black Sea ports.

“There is yet another question regarding grains and fertilizers. [It is necessary] to strengthen the Istanbul agreement and to continue its fulfillment so that Russian fertilizers reach the poorest countries via Turkey,” Erdoğan said at a meeting with Russian President Vladimir Putin.



The UN, Russia, Turkey and Ukraine signed a document in Istanbul on July 22 to open a grain corridor from three Ukrainian ports – Chornomorsk, Odesa and Pivdenny.



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## UKRAINE ALMOST COMPLETELY STOPPED EXPORT OF COKE

Ukraine in January-September of this year reduced the export of coke and semi-coke in kind by 98% compared to the same period last year – up to 3.697 thousand tons.

According to statistics published by the State Customs Service (STS), in monetary terms, the export of coke and semi-coke over this period fell by 97.5% to \$987,000.

At the same time, the main exports were to Hungary (43.62% in monetary terms), Georgia (38.56%) and Turkey (17.81%).



Ukraine in January-September 2022 imported 331.941 thousand tons of coke and semi-coke, which is 30.8% less compared to January-September 2021. In monetary terms, imports decreased by 11.2% – to \$164.592 million. Imports were carried out mainly from the Russian Federation (46.04% of deliveries in monetary terms), Poland (29.94%) and the Czech Republic (13.87%).

As reported, Ukraine in 2021 increased the export of coke and semi-coke in physical terms by 3.3 times compared to 2020 – up to 194.535 thousand tons. In monetary terms, the export of coke and semi-coke over this period increased by 4.8 times – up to \$41.838 million. The main exports were to Kazakhstan (29.03% of deliveries in monetary terms), Turkey (20.06%) and Algeria (%).



# INCREASE IN NUMBER OF CANCER DIAGNOSES EXPECTED IN UKRAINE IN POST-WAR PERIOD – EXPERTS

An increase in the number of oncological diagnoses is expected in Ukraine in the post-war period, which will be caused by insufficient diagnosis during the war.

This opinion was expressed by the participants of the round table held at the Interfax-Ukraine agency on Wednesday and dedicated to the problem of wartime oncology.

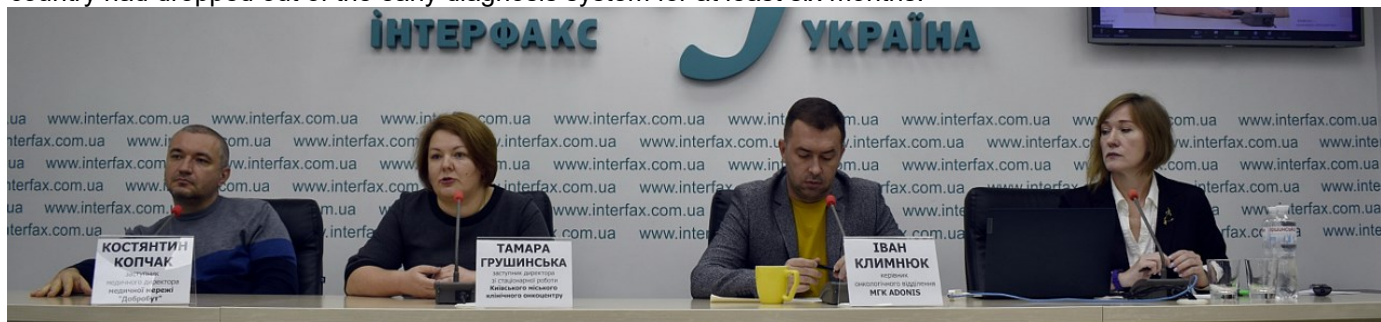
“Today, the influence of stress on the onset of cancer has not been proven, but during the war, all chronic diseases, including cancer, are definitely exacerbated. Therefore, we expect an acceleration in the development of cancer. Interruption in treatment and diagnosis leads to the worsening of the situation. The statistics of oncological diseases after our victory, I think, for many will be a big “surprise” in a negative way,” said Kostiantyn Kopchak, the deputy medical director of the Dobrobut network, said.

According to the forecasts of the deputy director for inpatient work of the Kyiv City Clinical Oncology Center, Tamara Hrushynska, the sad statistics on the incidence of oncology will be visible in 1.5 years.

“Some patients did not have the opportunity to receive the necessary medical care during active hostilities, for example, when there was only one family doctor in the whole city or people did not have the opportunity to get to the clinic. I think the sad statistics will appear in a year and a half. We will see that the number of oncological diseases will increase much, unfortunately,” she said.

She noted the number of patients in the Kyiv Oncology Center has not decreased, people traveled from different regions and received help.

For his part, Ivan Klymniuk, the head of the oncology department of the ADONIS clinic, said that almost the entire country had dropped out of the early diagnosis system for at least six months.



“People focused on survival and safety, they did not think about screening and diagnosis. We will see the echoes of the war in the field of oncology a little later, there will be many neglected forms. If earlier the patient could be diagnosed at the first-second stage, which makes it possible to stop the process, then now we will face the fact that cancer will be detected at the third-fourth stage,” he said.

At the same time, he stressed that now all representatives of the oncological service of Ukraine have consolidated and are providing assistance to patients.

The growth of neglected forms of oncological pathologies is also expected by the head of the parliamentary subcommittee on the prevention and control of oncological diseases of the committee of the nation’s health, medical care and medical insurance, Valeriy Zub.

“This is logical, because there were interruptions in treatment, untimely diagnosis and the inability to go to a medical facility. We predict and, unfortunately, we already see: the number of neglected forms of cancer has been growing in most cancer centers even in recent months,” he states.

Zub considers it necessary to reconfigure the work of the oncology service, since it will be necessary to carry out more complicated surgical interventions and apply more complex chemotherapy regimens.

According to him, the working group created in the Ministry of Health will develop proposals for adjusting the development of the oncological service, taking into account the current situation.

“The task is not to return the oncological service to the form in which it was before, but to make it better, in particular making regional oncology centers better,” he said.

## UKRAINE EXPORTED MORE THAN 20 MILLION TONS OF GRAIN WORTH \$5.2 BILLION

Ukraine in January-August 2022 exported 20.2 million tons of main grain crops, which is a quarter less than in the same period in 2021, while foreign exchange earnings from their supplies decreased by 18% to \$5.22 billion.

In terms of crops, 15.1 million tons of corn for \$3.8 billion, 4.1 million tons of wheat for \$1.2 billion and 0.8 million tons of barley for \$0.2 billion were sold abroad in eight months of 2022, according to the website National Research Center "Institute of Agrarian Economics" on Tuesday.



*The leading position in the ranking of the main importers of Ukrainian grains was retained by China, whose share in the total grain exports over this period amounted to 14.4% (\$749 million). Significant parts of Ukrainian grain exports also fell on Romania (13.9%), Turkey (9.6%), Egypt (7.7%), Spain (7.0%), Poland (6.8%), the Netherlands (4.3%), Iran (3.1%) and Hungary (3.0%).*

Together, the above countries bring almost 70% of the income from all exports of grain crops from Ukraine.

As reported with reference to the Ukrainian Agrarian Business Club (UCAB) association, Ukraine exported 6.9 million tons of agricultural products in September 2022 (+ 52% compared to August 2022) due to the resumption of shipping with food cargo from the three Black Sea ports of the country to under the Istanbul Grain Agreements. In terms of crops, 4.4 million tons of grain crops were supplied to foreign markets, of which 2.16 million tons of corn, 1.8 million tons of wheat and 440 thousand tons of barley.

Earlier, the association reported that in August Ukraine exported 4.6 million tons of agricultural products, in July – 3.0 million tons, in June – 2.7 million tons. According to the Ministry of Agrarian Policy of Ukraine, in May agricultural exports amounted to 1.74 million tons, in April – 0.96 million tons, in March – 0.33 million tons.

Prior to the full-scale Russian military invasion, Ukraine exported an average of 5-6 million tons of agricultural products per month, mainly through its maritime infrastructure in the Black Sea.

## UKRAINE ALLOWS FUMIGATION OF GRAIN ABROAD

The Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine allowed exporters to carry out fumigation or disinfection of grain cargo outside Ukraine from Ukrainian legal entities accredited by the State Food and Consumer Service or from foreign companies.

As reported on the website of the Ministry of Agrarian Policy and Food of Ukraine on Wednesday, the resolution adopted by the government will help unblock the passage of sea vessels with agricultural products under the Istanbul grain agreements.

The document instructs the National Bank of Ukraine to ensure the transfer of funds to pay for grain cargo exporting companies for services related to fumigation and disinfection of grain outside Ukraine, and also regulates the remuneration of the commission agent for these operations.





# UKRAINE DOUBLED REVENUE FROM EXPORT OF OIL CROPS, REDUCED BY 11% FOR OILS AND FATS

In January-August 2022, Ukraine doubled its revenue from the export of oilseeds compared to the same period last year – up to \$1.71 billion, but reduced the supply of vegetable fats and oilseed processing products – by 11%, to \$3.65 billion

As reported on the website of the National Research Center “Institute of Agrarian Economics” on Friday, during the specified period, 1.6 million tons of sunflower seeds were exported for \$823 million, 0.9 million tons of rapeseed for \$415 million and 0.8 million tons of soybeans for \$413 million.



*It is specified that the largest buyers of oilseeds for the eight months of 2022 were Romania (19.3% of the total), Bulgaria (18.0%), Turkey (16.9%), Poland (12.2%), Hungary (7.9%), Germany (5.9%), Moldova (3.7%) and the Netherlands (3.1%). The total share of these eight countries in domestic exports of oilseeds was 87%.*

In turn, in January-August 2022, Ukraine exported vegetable oils and fats of all kinds for \$3.65 billion, which is 11% less than last year's figures for the corresponding period.

According to the IAE, the main export product of this group is sunflower oil, whose export earnings for eight months of this year amounted to \$3.36 billion, or 92% of all supplies of oil and fats.



The largest buyers of Ukrainian vegetable oils and fats of all kinds in January-August 2022 were Poland with a share of 14.5%, followed by India (11.7%), Turkey (9.8%), the Netherlands (8.1%), Italy (5.4%), Bulgaria (4.9%), Spain (4.7%), Romania (4.5%). Together, these countries account for about 64% of the export value of vegetable oils and fats.

# REVENUE FROM EXPORT OF DAIRY PRODUCTS FROM UKRAINE IN SEPTEMBER REACHED RECORD

Revenue from the export of dairy products from Ukraine in September reached a record since the beginning of the year – \$35.9 million, which is 9.2% more than in August 2022, and 2.45 times more than in September 2021.

According to the website of the Association of Milk Producers, such growth was facilitated by high export prices for dairy products and the preferential regime introduced by the EU for the export and transit of Ukrainian goods.

It is specified that in September Ukraine exported 4,900 tonnes of milk powder (more by 51% compared to August 2022) in the amount of \$15.8 million (more by 39.8%), 1,100 tonnes of cheese (up 8.9%) worth \$5.08 million (up 3.7%), as well as 327 tonnes of fermented milk products (up 19.6%).



The association clarified that the total import of dairy products to Ukraine in September decreased by 19% compared to August due to the cheap hryvnia. In general, dairy products worth \$16.3 million were imported to Ukraine during the month.

It also underlined that a seasonal reduction in dairy exports should be expected in October, but its figures will still be high compared to last year.
